[The readers should stand in 1-2-3 order in front of the chancel. They can begin several feet apart and gradually move closer together. There should be some adornment to suggest that they are angels (tinsel halos or white robes would suffice).]

Two: A child born of woman . . . unusual grace.

One: A child born of God for the whole human race.

Three: How should we let it be known?

[pace builds]

One: A surprise is in order in announcing *this* birth.

Two: We must tell those among the poor of the earth.

Three: For they are most likely to be filled with mirth

Two: . . . mirth that is worthy of this special birth.

[pace quickens]

One: Then let it be done, let the angel choir gather!

Three: And they'll spring from their slumber to see what is the matter

Two: . . . those shepherds abiding in fields down there . . .

One:... when angelic voices come out of the air!

Two: Announce the Good News to all the forlorn!

Three: And to all those now battered by life's raging storm!

One: To you and to all, the Christ Child is born!

[Follow with a reading of Luke 2:8-18 or by singing a carol such as *Angels from the Realms of Glory*]
